I have watched him grow in politics, in life, in his Christianity and service to God and his church. He's always remained humble and sincere in the work he does of the people who elected him, but also for his church and family. His major passions on the political side of getting things done I dare to say are Education, HIV/AIDS, and Health. He's very deserving of the award he received.

Bill Richardson. He's the owner of the Rose Flower Shop at 1903 Chelten Avenue, (Ogontz and Stenton Avenue. Mr. Bill has been a successful businessman for more than 40 years in Philadelphia and over that time period he's owned a variety of different business, however for the last 25 years, he's been in the flower business and he loves it. But he's not just in business. He's a man that cares about our city and cares about our community and cares about our people. Now let me tread very carefully here. Don't tell nobody this, but Mr.. Bill as we fondly call him in the community, is one of those business owners who when he learns of a tragic death and a family with no cash, he's been one of those to stand up and say, come to my place. I'll take care of the flowers, no charge, compliments of the Rose Flower Shop." (Now don't everyone go calling Mr. Bill asking for free services for a loved one. He is a businessman, in business to make money. Mr. Bill doesn't do what he does for fame or publicity. He does it because he cares. He was also very deserving of his award from Miss Fran and her board of directors.

Joey Temple. Lord, what can I say about Joey T? I've known him since I was twenty-one years old. First met him out at WDAS. Truth be told, Joey got there before me, but difference is, he was "hanging-out" with Georgie Woods and Cody Anderson when he could get time, but

I was out there working in the newsroom, trying to keep up with the likes of Karen Warrington, Bob Perkins, Charles Harmon, Ken Mann, Wynne Alexander, etc. While I thought at the time, Joey T was just "hanging out", what the brother was actually doing, was sucking up all the knowledge he could about music. In the process of hanging out with people like Georgie Woods and being around Cecil B. Moore back in the day and other strong activist like Roxanne Jones and David P. Richardson, a

lot of their love of self and pride in who we are and whom we belong to, Joey turned out well. With all due respect, the Temple Family and the Patton family don't make no junk, nor does God and so Joey Temple like many of the rest of us, does indeed have lots of things to give to the universe, amongst that, he can play some music. He also works for social justice in our community and so yes he too was deserving of his award and accolades last weekend.

Grace Diggs Stevenson. She's some kind of special at 94 years young and as fabulous and spicy as they come. She helped to found the Woodford Tennis Club, the first Black owned and operated tennis club in the nation and it's nestled right in the Germantown section of the city. She and the rest of the founders had the guts to start a tennis club when they discovered much to their dismay that even though blacks were supposed to be free in America, blacks were not treated equally and the only way our people could participate in many areas of sport was by starting our own teams and clubs. It took thirty, forty years to just begin to break some of the color barriers in the sports area. To Gracie Stevenson's credit, she and her co-founders can take a bow for their guts, tenacity, stick-to-it-tiveness, brains, brilliance and more for what they did. She is very deserving.

Dr. Arlene Ackerman. Depending on whom you talk to in Philly, she's the most beloved or the most hatedupon leader of the Philadelphia public school system in many years. What I'm trying to figure out is why? To be very clear, I am a Dr. Arlene Ackerman supporter. I love her. I respect her. She is qualified, dignified, certified and prayed-afied to lead the Philadelphia public school district., Just a few months back Dr. Ackerman was named the number one leader, (CEO) of a public School in a major market city like Philadelphia. She was number one. So why is it that it seems a group of people want to keep trying to bring her down or paint a picture of her which is not true.

30 young African-American men work dispel stereotypes and counteract Cradle to Prison Pipeline epidemic

Last week, over a four-day period, 30 young African-American men, ages 13-17 and from the Philadelphia area, worked together to poke holes in the theory that they are more likely to become prison inmates than high school graduates.

Michele Lawrence, Senior VP and Community Banking President with Wells Fargo, and Howard Jean of the Call Me Mister Teacher Leadership Development Program, hosted the Saving Our Boys Summer Leadership Development Institute, Thursday, August 11-Sunday, August 14, which worked to counteract the ever increasing high school dropout rates amongst African-American males, and to decrease the cradle to prison pipeline epidemic that plagues their community.

Daily, from 7:15am to 8:00pm, on the campus of Chevney University, the 30 young men were challenged to expand their notions of success, hard work, discipline, manhood, leadership and personal development. With

the help of such local leaders as Marcus Allen, CEO at ACHIEVEability; Thomas Butler, Executive Director of Project Grad; Greg Corbin, Director of the Philly Youth Poetry Movement; Jordan Harris, Executive Director of the Philadelphia Youth Commission; Dr. Doreen Loury, Executive Director of the Black Male Development Symposium and Associate Professor of Sociology at Arcadia University; and noted author and principal Salome Thomas-El, the young men discussed such topics as how to interview; the importance of first, second and third impressions; money management and wealth building; self-expression through artistic endeavors; how the media affects the image we have of ourselves; what problems ail our communities and how we plan to solve them; and the power of words.

Deja Vu all over again

gone horribly wrong in Britain. If we are ever to confront the problems which have been exposed in the past week, it is essential to bear in mind that they do not only exist in inner-city housing estates. The culture of greed and impunity we are witnessing on our TV screens stretches right up into corporate boardrooms and the Cabinet. It embraces

the police and large parts of our media. It is not just its damaged youth, but Britain itself that needs a moral reformation."

There was something eerily familiar with the rioting going on in London if you are old enough to remember the 60's and 70's or the Rodney King fiasco in the 90's. In these situations due to a long train of government indifference, police brutality and misconduct the people had a Popeye moment, "That's alls I can stands and I can't stands no more" and went off. When the US government facilitated the murder of Martin Luther King Jr in 1968, all across the country in over one hundred cites Black folks had Popeye moments and lit the fires to their immediate environment. They did so because they couldn't or wouldn't set fire to the downtown business areas. All across the country the government responded by calling out the National Guard and when the fires went out they called for "investigations" into the causes of the riots as if they didn't already know.

When I first heard about the riots in London I thought to myself "there's more to this than we are being told by the US media". So I went Online and read more about the situation and I discovered the people in Tottenham in

North London snapped after a Black man named Mark Duggen was shot and killed by the London police. To put this in proper context, Tottenham is a section of London heavily inhabited by a large number of immigrants especially people of Afro- Caribbean origin. And to add insult to injury there have been numerous incidents of Black Londoners killed while in Police custody or being confronted by the police. Being Black here in the US, that's all you need to know to intuit the conditions in Tottenham and how these brothers and sisters were viewed and treated by the Brits and the police.

Taking a page from US police, the London police said Duggen had brandished a gun and shot at them. When I read that I said to myself "hmm, this sounds familiar". However eyewitnesses, family and friends said Duggen was unarmed and the police simply shot him. That too struck a resonant cord of past police misconduct and brutality here in the US. True to form, at first the London officials and media backed the police officers' narrative promising a full investigation when the community protested the killing. Now facts are emerging that contradict several aspects of the police narrative. For example, the bullets allegedly fired at police that lodged in one of their radios was of police caliber issue! Say what?

Yep. What probably happened was the police started firing recklessly and a few stray bullets hit one of their radios. Does my hypothesis sound familiar? Just like here in America, the British police have been harassing, framing and brutalizing Africans and immigrants with impunity or redress for years. The community finally got tired of it; especially since they don't have jobs and the government is cutting social programs to pay off the banksters who ran England into an economic ditch just like here in the US

Duggen's family and the Tottenham community held a peaceful vigil and protest at the Tottenham Metropolitan Police precinct station. For some reason, the London police attacked the protesters and rumors spread the police had brutally beaten a sixteen year old girl. The people already suffering from rampant and discriminatory police misconduct, poverty and being squeezed by the government's austerity plan to cut an gut social welfare

programs lost it and fought the police back.

As word spread about the police beating of the girl via word of mouth, cell phones and other social communications instruments, the outrage spread across London and so did the violence. Next thing you know two days later, violence erupted in Liverpool, Birmingham, Bristol, Nottingham, Medway and Leichester but this time it wasn't just Black folks it was white youth too. These young people are disaffected and alienated because they are being ravaged by a vicious class war raging throughout Europe. They've seen their elected officials in scandal after scandal kowtowing to the international banksters while giving them the short stick, and they are fed up

The reaction of the government officials was deja vu for me. When I saw pictures of a London official calling for "law and order" I had flashbacks to the 60's and 70's in the good of US of A. I recalled the state sponsored crack down on dissent by the government on every level. I thought about the long range impact of the government's ruthless COINTELPRO, Huston Plan and Operation Chaos counterinsurgency campaigns, the militarization of the police and its correlation to our moribund Negro leadership, lack of gumption and sense of powerlessness in the face of increasing oppression. I thought about the governments' callous response to our people's plight during Hurricane Katrina and the rogue cops who went on a killing rampage in New Orleans, who almost got away with it. Thinking about that, I came to the conclusion the situation in Tottenham London and our condition here are very similar.

As I listened to the London officials denounce the looting, I had flashbacks of US politicians calling for "law and order" but saying and doing nothing about racism as a national psychosis, rampant police brutality, widespread lawlessness and corruption in high places and the US waging war on black and brown people around the world. Lo and behold when a few London youth were interviewed by their media, they mentioned these very same issues as causes for their outrage and violent outbursts.

Former major league baseball player and manager Yogi Berra, the master of malapropism, once said, "This is deja vu all over again". So it is.

Open Letter

BLACK PR WIRE) – WASHINGTON--(BUSINESS WIRE)--The following is an open letter from the National Association of Black Journalists to the BBC on recent coverage by the network which the NABJ has deemed racially insensitive.

Dear BBC:

The National Association of Black Journalists, the oldest and largest organization of black journalists, is disappointed to learn that the BBC, an organization long known for accuracy and impartiality, is failing to adhere to its own values.

In the height of recent riots in Britain, the BBC simplistically asked on the global phone-in program World Have Your Say, "Is there a problem with young black men?"

In asking such a question, the BBC offended many in its global audience. The question infers that young black men were the only ones rioting and looting, which we find to be inflammatory. If that's the case, we call on the BBC to provide the proof. We are struggling to understand this stunning lack of sensitivity because the BBC has a longstanding reputation of integrity, accuracy and impartiality with very clear editorial guidelines.

In another incident, the BBC allowed historian David Starkey, a guest on the Newsnight television program, to say that "whites have become blacks" in reference to the race of rioters. Even more disturbing, the Newsnight presenter did not challenge that bizarre assertion - on a program that regularly holds people accountable for their views. By allowing the comment to go unchallenged, was the BBC agreeing with the inference that becoming black is monolithically synonymous with being violent?

All of this in a week when a BBC presenter inaccurately said that veteran civil rights campaigner and broadcaster Darcus Howe had been involved in previous riots when in fact he was not and had to correct the presenter on-air.

Is this just a case of shocking incompetence or racism -- as others have said? Why have black people in Britain not been afforded the same respect given to others? Why is the assumption that if something is negative pertaining to black people it is deemed acceptable by the BBC? What happened to the BBC's duty to provide accurate and balance reporting? This raises the question of whether the BBC's senior editorial ranks need better racial and philosophical diversity to avoid being blind to such insensitive incidents.

NABJ represents black journalists worldwide. We call on the BBC to return to practicing the type of journalism that has won it international acclaim. We will continue to monitor the BBC to ensure that its reporting about blacks lives up to its own values.

"Without attachment loss cannot exist and without love it is death that has no dominion. This is why real does not happen very often to people who break easily, or who have sharp edges or who have to be carefully kept."

To love, to me, means to put yourself, your heart, out in front, to feel, to hurt, and to be. For without the ability to do this we cannot love to our fullest extent as human beings. In all life "a little rain must fall". If we do not allow ourselves to get wet, how can we know what rain is? How can we "be" and experience the force, the overwhelming feeling of love and all that it entails? To love deeply and truly means that someday we will feel the pain of loss. Feeling the loss is to be truly alive, though the hurt may be beyond almost our ability to deal with it.

The Velveteen Rabbit has other lessons to convey as we read and understand a child s love for his toys and how the child grows up to be an adult with the capacity to love expanded in his heart as it is said in the story "The Wizard of Oz" about the broken-hearted tin man who is given a heart not realizing he had a heart already. The brain the straw man had but didn t think he had illustrates the same idea as does the courage of the lion when he had the courage to face life all along with love and the capacity to extend that love to everyone he could to everyone on God s good earth.

Getting ready for school

From new backpacks to sharp pencils, parents across the country are doing their best to cross the items off their children's backto-school checklists. They want to be sure that

when the first day of school comes, their children will have everything they need to be ready to start and ready to learn. But as a country we're failing to do the same thing and in the current budget debate, some of our

leaders are threatening to do just the opposite. Instead of budgeting our limited resources wisely so we'll be able to stock up on the things we know our children need, some shrill, ideologically driven leaders are hijacking the political process and trying to grab money out of our children's small piggybanks and spend it on more gift cards for big corporations and billionaires. No new tax pledges have been signed by 277 members of Congress throwing the entire weight of debt reduction on children, our poorest Americans, the homeless, jobless, helpless, and a middle class treading water and trying to stay afloat.

We know that between birth and age five, children learn social, emotional, behavioral, and cognitive skills that set the foundation for academic success. Factors including poverty and the "lottery of geography" create barriers to young children's healthy development. Cognitive gaps emerge between children from families with low and higher incomes as early as nine months, and more often than not, these children are unable to catch up by the time they enter kindergarten. The resulting achievement gap increases over time and often propels children into the cradle to prison pipeline – especially if they are poor children of color.

Quality child care and early childhood educational experiences are crucial to giving children a sound start in life – but they are still out of reach for many families. Although child care is a necessity for many families with working parents, the annual cost of center-based child care for a four-year-old is more than the annual in-state tuition at a public four-year college in 33 states and the District of Columbia. In 18 states, a family must have an

income below 175 percent of the poverty level (below \$32,043 for a family of four) to receive a public child care subsidy. Only 13.8 percent of three-year-olds and 38.9 percent of four-year-olds were in state-funded pre-kindergarten programs, Head Start, or early intervention/special education in 2008-2009 and only 10 states require all schools districts to offer full day kindergarten to get children ready for school.

Without positive early childhood experiences, it is easy for children to fall behind in school and American education, which used to be the envy of the world, is in dire straits. Many public school students, kindergarten through 12th grade, are struggling; children of color and poor children struggle most. More than 60 percent of all fourth, eighth, and 12th grade public school students and nearly 80 percent or more of Black and Hispanic public school students in the same grades are reading or doing math below grade level. The U.S. ranks 24th among 30 developed countries on overall educational achievement for 15-year-olds, and in a study of education systems in 60 countries, we ranked 31st in math achievement and 23rd in science achievement for 15-year-olds. Too often children fall behind in school and drop out, increasing

their risk of entering the cradle to prison pipeline. Staying in school and receiving a quality education are the best deterrents to juvenile delinquency and the surest route towards responsible, productive adulthood. Yet almost half of our states spend on average more than three times as much per prisoner as per public school pupil. I can't think of a dumber investment policy, one that hurts countless children and families every day.

It's clear we're not getting our children what they need to be ready for and to succeed in school and to learn all that we need them to know in order to keep our workforce, military, and country strong in the future. It's time for every voter to tell those shrill partisan and ideologically driven extremists that America's children are not to be sacrificial lambs on the altar of their destructive agendas. If we saw parents spending money to buy themselves a private jet but sending their child to school unprepared, hungry, and empty-handed, we would be shocked and furious at how misguided their priorities were. Why should any of our nation's leaders be allowed to make the same choice?

Film Review

The Help-An homage to the struggle



Actor and now Writer/Director Tate Taylor (Winters Bone) has struck career gold in bringing this refreshing tale to the screen. He must be on top of the world right now as what was once merely hot Hollywood buzz has become the hottest ticket at the box office. Adapted from the novel of the same name written by Kathryn Stockett; THE HELP is a delightful tale of the complex dynamics surrounding the relationships between African American domes-

tics and the women of the homes and children that they care for.

Set in 1963 Jackson, Mississippi in the height of the civil rights struggle; THE HELP opens with Aibilene (Viola Davis) who solemnly dissertates on the dismal dynamics of raising a child to only later become the underclass subordinate to that child once they come of age. She's reared well over a dozen Caucasian children and is now currently the serving as the help for Miss Jolene French - an aloof and inept mother whom Aibilene secretly harbors contempt for. It's summer of 1963, it's hot and change is creeping up upon Mississippi. Skeeter (Emma Stone), a society girl, has just arrived home from college and is eager to attempt her hand at a writing career. She's taken on a column at a local paper and has decided that she wants to write an anonymous book on the domestics who work in her community of privileged White society... from the point of view of the domestic. After discovering that her own aging caretaker Constantine (the legendary Cicely Tyson) has somehow mysteriously returned home to her own family, Skeeter pursues an initially reluctant Aibilene who soon enough agrees to meet her clandestinely at Aibilenes home. In the process Skeeter hopes that other domestics will also follow suit. In the meantime the civil rights movement is erupting before them. Medgar Evers has been murdered and Negros are itching to embrace progress while forced to remain humble in the face of their employers who can fire them on a dime. Skeeter as well must walk the fine line of being tied to the high-society of Jackson Miss. Grappling with the expectation of marrying quickly, being warm, perky and a good cook, while pursuing her real aspirations of career and hearkening to the dictates of her doubting conscious.

On other domestic fronts, Aibilenes closest friend Minny (Octavia Spenser) is saddled with Miss Hilly (Bryce Dallas Howard) new adult mistress of the house and an overt racist who is set on her legal initiative to make sure Negros will not be able to use the same bathroom as their White employers. While Miss Hilly's mother Mrs. Walters (the incomparable Sissy Spacek) was far more tolerable; Hilly has turned out to be the mistress from hell and fires Minny after Minny attempts to use the family bathroom before heading home into a dangerous rainstorm. But Minny is later hell bent on seeing Miss Hilly pay and begins to tread a slippery slope of revenge against the influential White society woman.

THE HELP is tenderly written and directed by Taylor who is likely to garner a few award kudos - perhaps even an Oscar, for this light-hearted, not overly melodra-

matic screen depiction of the humbling African American road to progress in the U.S. Now in 2011... Negro men are freely able to roam the streets in their own selfafflicted humiliation (whether or not they know it) with their pants hanging below the cheeks of their rear ends. We are now free to sit in the front of the bus, drink from any

fountain, and show our rear-ends.

It is almost a waste to extol the talents of Viola Davis since there simply isn't a production that she can't steal with her grace and eloquence - and this one is no different. That being said, I felt the most compelling performance was delivered by Bryce Dallas Howard (daughter of child actor turned mega producer/director - Ron Howard) as Miss Hilly and Octavia Spencer as the sassy, but abused Minny. Both of these performances supplied the heat for this mostly genteel tale, and let's face it nobody remembers warm and fuzzy. We remember the grit and Howard and Spencer masterfully deliver it. To date I'd deemed Howard to be nothing more than the product of a famous father, but finally with her performance in The Help, she has come into her own. Her confidence, polish and performance sophistication now leaps off of the screen. Her timing as the despicable Hilly Holbrook, is a good as any of the other outstanding cast members from Cicely Tyson as Constantine, Allison Janney as Skeeter's mother Charlotte and the gracefully aging Sissy Spacek. Emma Stone in her starring role as Skeeter will as well cement a long-standing career her.

The Help tells a bitter-sweet tale, that is tranquil, eloquent and muted. Rated PG-13 it's suitable for some of our younger audiences and may indeed offer younger American's of all nationalities a glimpse into a time and history not so long ago in the U.S., that they may have not otherwise known existed, or had only heard about. THE HELP puts a face on this era again, as a reminder to those (Black and White) who may have become complacent about their past struggles and transgressions, and for those who do not fully comprehend the overt injustices suffered by those who came before them and who are still alive today. This history is not ancient, it's recent. It's my hope that some younger, more complacent Black men and women will take the time to reexamine their freedoms and not take them for granted. Standing out amongst the crowd can be a magnificent thing. But standing out and attainting yourself in face of your family and the entire world is a whole other thing.



"Tonight is the Night" to listen to Betty Wright

"I Just Keep My Flow"

Late one Saturday evening we asked Betty Wright what she felt enabled her to have such staying power in music. She pauses for a moment and explains:

"The only thing I can think of is that is something God gave to me to do. We talk about it everyday, the Rappers and myself. It's just a real joy to tell a story and have somebody to listen. It's like being the class clown, kind of mixed with being a minister because you are definitely giving out words of life.... When a disc jockey gets on the air and takes that microphone, it is in his hands to do good or evil with it. I don't take it lightly. I love what I'm doing. I've been doing it a long time and I have expanded what I do. That keeps it in focus. That means I don't really get tired of anything. If I feel like the songs are getting stale, I'll sing somebody else's songs. Or instead of singing, I might just produce something that somebody else has written. I just keep my flow."

For decades, Betty Wright has been keep her flow. By so doing she has maintained a steady core audience. This is not easy to do for nearly four decades, especially in a world where music is changing constantly.

Musical Family Origins in Miami

Wayblackmemores. Flashing back in space and time, Betty remembers: " My family was a family group (The Echoes of Joy) a long time ago; before I was born. My

mother was a musician, singer, songwriter. She had her own record label. Gospel. In those days you went out and pressed up your own records. She did everything. I am her image. She was our only musician, a guitarist. Guitar was my mother's first instrument. And voice. I remember recording for the first time. I was about two years old. I can remember it like it was today. Standing on stacks of phone books Trying to balance and having my sister look at me real evil like, 'you better not fall.'

First Born Church of the Living God

Memories: "My momma was saved from the age of seven. She was from First Born Church of The Living God. Holiness Church. Speaking in tongues. I've been saved ever since 1975. I was always in the church. But I had a little time when I was into Catholic School, 9th-12th grade. All my schooling was in Miami where I was born. During that period of time I had got really, really turned around to be something that I did not want to be. I had started fighting every day. Getting in a lot of trouble. I am thankful that I really got turned back around by a teacher, Miss Davis. She taught me in the second grade and when I got to the eighth grade, she happened to be at the other school I went to. One day, she just stopped me and said, "Come Here!' You have turned 180 degrees in the wrong direction. If you don't stop what you are doing, you're not going to make it. ' It hurt me because I knew she was right.?

No Pain, No Gain

Turning to her primary instrument --guitar, Betty states, "It is still my primary instrument. If you notice, take, "No Pain, No Gain," and have a country and western singer do it, you will think it was written for them... Country Music and Folk music has always been the mainstay of my writings. Gospel is folklore. Telling stories. Rap is a New Street Folklore. We were growing up with Bob Dylan, Peter, Paul and Mary, Simon Garfunkel. I listened to all of those folks. We were not able to listen to real hardcore rhythm and blues. But as I got older, I told my momma, 'If I'm going to be a bad person, I'm going to be a bad person. It's not going to be about a song. It's going to be about who I am.' Betty finally convinced her mother to allow her to do R & B. She released her first record at the age of twelve. By the time she was fourteen, she had a Top 40 hit called,

'Girls Can't Do What the Guys Do."

Born in Miami, Florida on 21 December 1953, Bessie Regina Norris was the youngest of seven children. She began her professional career at two and has had fifty five years in the business although she is not yet sixty years old. Northeast Philadelphia students honored for Summer of Learning, social action and community spirit

Closing ceremonies at a unique summer camp for children ages 10 to 14 were held on Friday morning, August 12th, honoring 56 campers who volunteered to improve their reading and math skills. The students also committed to taking part in "social action" projects that help their community. This was the first-ever Philadelphia Freedom School to hold a summer camp program at the Philadelphia Center for Arts and Technology (PCAT), itself a nationally-recognized initiative designed to help middle school students improve their academic performance while also emphasizing commitment to their heritage and the community. This program is organized by the lead agency Communities In Schools of Philadelphia, Inc., in partnership with community based site and partner PCAT. The Philadelphia Freedom Schools Program has been in operation in Philadelphia since 2005 serving eight additional K-8 sites throughout Philadelphia in addition to the PCAT site.

For the last six weeks, 56 PCAT Philadelphia Freedom Schools' scholars – children enrolled from all over the city, though most are from the West Oak Lane neighborhood where PCAT is located – volunteered to spend their weekday summer mornings improving their reading, math, and writing skills, while also choosing individual "social action" projects that they could launch in their own neighborhoods. Afternoons were spent enjoying a variety of enrichment activities including dance, music, gymnastics, karate, and theater. Program activities also encompassed lessons and projects that reinforce the students' skills in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM), a focal point of the nation's education agenda.

Closing ceremonies took place Friday, August 12, 2011, at PCAT, which runs a host of local community enrichment programs under the auspices of Foundations, Inc., a nationally-recognized leader in public education strategies.

"These young scholars have had a great summer, and we believe they will be returning to school this fall prepared to succeed in their classrooms and in their communities as well," said PCAT Summer Camp Director Jamisa Breeden

This week the band from Kansas City, Missouri that started out in the 1970's will share the spotlight with Harold Melvin and the Bluenotes, featuring Teddy Pendergrass.

Bloodstone, I had the opportunity to meet about the same time I meant Teddy Pendergrass while I worked in the News Department at WDAS Radio. At the time Bloodstone was on the T-Neck Records Label. These guys can sang. Even Mr.Rock, of Chester knows how

awesome these guys are. What's up Rock?


The original group "Bloodstone" debuted in 1973 as a doo-wop group that evolved into one of the best Soul groups of the 70's and today. The successful, "Outside Woman" touches all the nuances of slipping outside of your relationship to taste the grass on the other side of the fence. It's like tasting the golden brown chicken wings brother E-U serves down at Diane's Lounge, on Chester's notorious Westend. E also has tasty shrimp and one customer wanted to know how much for just one shrimp. I gotta get the answer from Big Ernie's baby

Meanwhile back to the Bloodstone compilation, "We go a Long Way Back" takes me back to the 1980's and WUSS radio in Atlantic City. I helped to make this song a million seller on the T-neck label in New Jersey. That was more fun than the law allows.

Bloodstone's "I love You" helps the old Bluesman say happy 39th anniversary to Evone Kornegay Gray. She

really puts up with the old boy. The writer of this song says"I'll' buy you diamonds and pearls, I'll take you all around the world, because I love you'

It was really fun listening to all that Bloodstone and Bloodstone album with

covers that were never released including the late Linda Jones' "Hypnotized" and "Tower of Power's" "You're still a young man". Boy this stuff is good!

What's happening at B & E Lounge this weekend? Well Saturday is a jam with Wanda and Ms. Patsie along with Lady B on the box. A nice place to chill for the afternoon and watch the pretty girls. Hey Jiffy give Wanda a raise, she's a hard worker. A quick shout out to Mr. Bunky. What's up my Brother?

Now for Harold Melvin and the Blue Notes. This will be short and sweet, just like the lives of both Harold and Teddy. I knew these men well and liked to them both as entertainers but I also liked them as brothers because they stuck together. Harold liked Covosieur brandy. Do you have a Harold Melvin story, if so hit me on the email at curtisgray1411@yahoo.com.

Yes indeedy Kenny Gamble and Leon Huff hit pay dirt with this group. The former drummer, Teddy winds up the lead vocalist and front man for the group.

I think I may have been working at one of the radio stations in eastern North Carolina, when Philly International released the first Harold Melvin and the Blue Notes album with the cut, "If You Don't Know Me By Now" in, I believe 1973. What was it that Gamble and Huff saw in Teddy? Was it his physical attraction, his swagger or his raw talent. Well this writer got the chance to see Teddy in Atlantic City, Trenton, New York and Philadelphia and I know it was all of the above. This

Teddy could demand upwards of ten-thousand dollars a night easy during his early solo days when radio stations were pumping, "I don't Love You Anymore" and he was successful at grabbing the good cash many times.

Back-to-School Checklist: Supplies, clothes, social security form

If your son or daughter is a high school student turning 18, you've probably spent some time shopping for school supplies and the latest fashions, working out the schedule for the academic year, maybe even looking into colleges.

If your young senior is collecting monthly Social Security benefits, here's one more

thing to add to your "Back-to-School" checklist. To make sure that Social Security benefits continue beyond age 18, eligible students must obtain certification from school officials that they are still

in high school and provide it to Social Security. Otherwise, monthly Social Security benefits automatically stop when a student turns 18. For more information about Social Security student benefits, visit

www.socialsecurity.gov/schoolofficials. The website outlines how the process works with instructions on what the student and school official must do to ensure that benefits continue past the student's 18th birthday. With the appropriate certification, Social Security generally

does not stop benefits until the month before the month the student turns 19, or the first month in which he or she is not a full-time high school student, whichever is earlier. Some students receive Social Security survivors benefits because a parent is deceased. Others may get dependent benefits because their parent receives Social Security retirement or disability benefits. Benefits for minor children generally continue until age 18 — or 19 if they're still in high school. The only exception to this rule is if a student is disabled and eligible for childhood disability benefits. In that case, a separate application for benefits is required. Social Security's website also includes: a downloadable version of the required Student's Statement Regarding School Attendance (Form SSA-1372) that must be completed by the student, certified by the school, and returned to Social Security; answers to frequently asked questions for school officials and students; and a field office locator to find the address of your local Social Security office. So as you're buying school supplies, trying out back-to-school fashions, and figuring out when the holiday break begins, don't forget the important step of visiting

www.socialsecurity.gov/schoolofficials.
